When Mohamad and four other boys were innocently watching rubble being removed from a house destroyed in a cluster bomb strike, a truck bumped a tree, dislodging a cluster bomb. It detonated by Mohamad's feet and blew up into him. He was killed and all his friends were injured. The shoe in the foreground was blown off with part of his foot and ankle still in it.

If passed, the proposed Australian legislation on cluster bombs could see Australian troops assisting the US to use cluster bombs and would allow stockpiling of US cluster bombs in Australia.

Don't let this happen.

Fix the Bill by supporting amendments to the draft legislation.

The next time you buy footwear for your child or grandchild, think of the cluster bomb victim who won't need any.

Civilians make up 98% of cluster bomb victims. One third of them are children.
Death is frequent.

Injuries typically include loss of limbs and blindness
